Where to fish

The *rivière Archambault* (Archambault River), of about 13 miles long, takes its source in the *Lac Quenouilles* before being swelled by the Bride River and ends its journey in the falls of the same name.

The *chute Archambault* (Archambault Falls), of about 49 feet in height, is situated in the *Parc national du Mont-Tremblant* in the Laurentian region near the *La Diable Sector*, which was called Archambault Township in the past.

Fishermen can find a wide variety of fish including brook trout, northern pike, largemouth bass and rainbow trout.

Whether you're fly fishing or trolling, your chances of catching a fish are good.

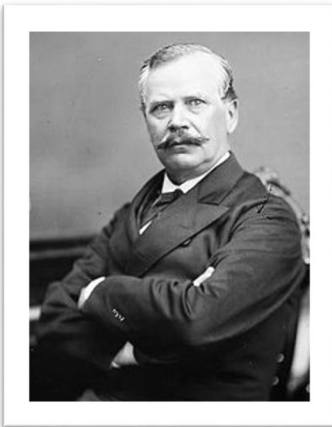
The Lac Archambault in Saint-Donat

This magnificent lake of 6.3 miles long offers beautiful scenery with several peaks: Black Mountain is 2844 feet in height. Fishermen can find trout, rainbow trout, pike and bass.

This is at the request of parish priest Provost, with the support of the Honorable Louis Archambault, Ministry of Agriculture and Public Works that the Canadian Government award the necessary credits to realise a road between Sainte-Marguerite-du-Lac-Masson, (Laurentides, Québec), and the Matawin River, (Lanaudière, Québec). That road, the first to deserve Saint-Donat, (Laurentides, Québec), would go down to the discharges of the Lac Archambault in 1869. The main objective was to join the most recent establishments at the east of Saint-Michel-des-Saints (Lanaudière, Québec) and Saint-Zénon, (Lanaudière, Québec). The road would be called chemin Provost that was used by the first settlers.

The *canton Archambault* (Archambault Township), like *Lac Archambault*, (Archambault Lake) were named in memory of Notary Louis Archambault (1814-1890), he was also a federal and municipal politician in Québec.

The lac Archambault, parc national de la Jacques-Cartier
named in memory of René Archambault who participated in the First World War

This lake has an area of 103 ha and outfall into the *rivière Sautoriski* (Sautoriski River). The lake's name was given as part of a systematic designation of water bodies of this part of the *Parc national de la Jacques-Cartier*, when it belonged at the time to the *Parc national des Laurentides*.

Fishermen can find brook trout in this *lac Archambault* (Archambault Lake).

Here we evoke the memory of René Archambault, son of Isidore, butcher, and Elisabeth Martel, born in Montréal, September 7, 1899 and baptized at the Immaculée-Conception Parish in Montréal the next day on September 8. His grandparents Louis Archambault and Odile Desjardins were named godparents.

René enlisted in his hometown of Montréal, on March 1917 in the 245th Battalion. He was transferred to the 22nd Battalion, nowadays the Royal 22nd Regiment. He died on August 27, 1918 at Chérisy, France. The Geography Commission, currently the Geographical Names Board, adopted this name in 1931.

The Ruisseau Archambault close to Brigham (Cantons-de-l'Est, Québec)

The *Ruisseau Archambault* (Archambault Brook) is located only 3.8 miles from Ange-Gardien (Montérégie, Québec). Fishermen can find a wide variety of fish including brook trout, rainbow trout, and yellow perch.

The Ruisseau Archambault in Saint-Antoine-sur-Richelieu

The Ruisseau Archambault (Archambault Brook), an other one, is a peaceful little stream, protected by a tree-line, it brings a little piece of nature to the heart of Saint-Antoine-sur-Richelieu (Montérégie, Québec), a village founded by four Archambault brothers.

Fishermen can find a wide variety of fish including brook trout, rainbow trout, and yellow perch. Whether you're spinning, fly fishing or trolling your chances are good.

This Archambault Brook outfall into the Richelieu River, which is home of over 50 species of fish: pike, small and largemouth bass, and it is not uncommon to catch the unknown bowfin.

La Marina of the Phare de Beloeil

The fishing enthusiasts who want to fish in the Richelieu aboard their own boat can go to *La Marina of the Phare de Beloeil* (Montérégie, Québec), (the Beloeil Lighthouse Marina). This marina operated by Sylvain Archambault, provides access to first class and high quality dock ramp. Sylvain is the son of Pierre and Thérèse Bernier. Pierre is the founder of *Le camping Terrasse Saint-Marc* (Terrasse Saint-Marc Campground).

The Marina du Commodore

The marina located on the Rivière des Prairies, Laval, is an institution for boaters and fishermen in the area, dating back over 85 years. The marina, property of Armand Archambault, husband of Françoise Courchesne is now managed by his son André since 1961. It will be demolished in 2014 or 2015 to be replaced by two large luxury condo buildings.

Before 1928, the place was a beach for vacationers.

Fishing enthusiasts of this marina located in Laval can tackle bass, smelt, black crappie, walleye and pike.

Cours d'eau Archambault

Cours d'eau Archambault (Archambault Stream) is located just 3.8 miles from Maricourt, near Sainte-Christine (Cantons-de-l'Est, Québec) (Eastern Townships).

Fishing enthusiasts can find a wide variety of fish including brook trout, rainbow trout, and yellow perch.

Branche Archambault

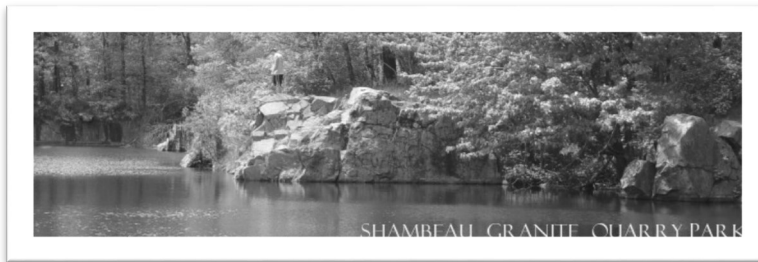
Branche Archambault (Archambault Branch) is a river brook located just 2.5 miles from Laval, near Bois-des-Filion, (Lanaudière, Québec). Fishermen can find a wide variety of fish including brook trout, rainbow trout, and perch.

Shambeau Lake, Waupaca County, Wisconsin

Shambeau Lake



Shambeau Lake is a lake located just 5.2 miles from Manawa, in Waupaca County, in the state of Wisconsin, United States, near Ogdensburg, Wisconsin. Fishermen will find a variety of fish including largemouth bass, bluegill and crappie here. So grab your favorite fly fishing rod and reel, and head out to Shambeau Lake. If all goes well, the brim will be hooked by your crickets, the crappie will be biting your grubs and the largemouth will be grabbing your frog.



Shambeau Park

Located on the northeast side of Waupaca off Country Trunk E, this park encompasses an old, water-filled granite quarry.

The first Francis (François) Archambault (Shambeau) born at L'Assomption (Lanaudière, Québec) in 1781, never went to Wisconsin. It was his son William Harrison, who was married to Sylvina S. Hopkins, who was one of the first pioneers of that region of Wisconsin.

A Shambeau Lake, a Shambeau Park, and a Shambeau Street were so named in Waupaca because of this family.

Barrage Michel-Archambault and the lac Michel-Archambault (Michel-Archambault's Dam and Michel-Archambault's Lake)

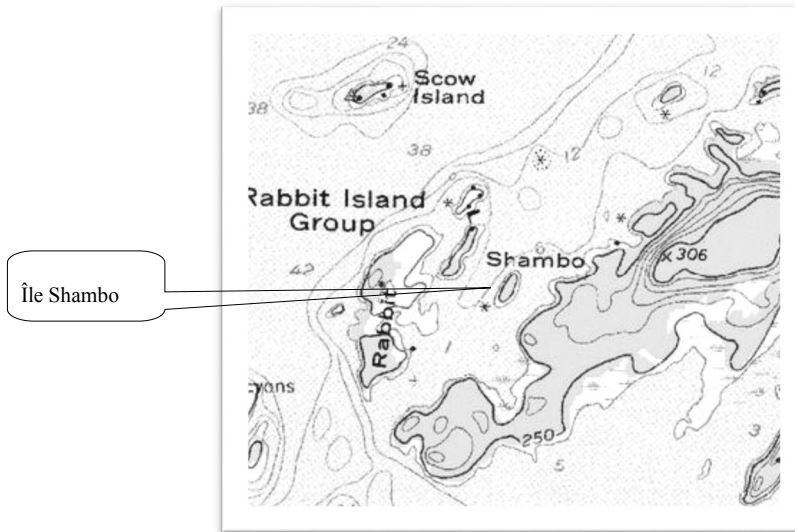
Michel Archambault, born on January 9th, 1911, married to Marie Jeanne Perreault on May 4th, 1935 in Joliette (Lanaudière, Québec), was the son of Arthur and Herménie Lépine.

The dam built in Sainte-Béatrix (Lanaudière, Québec) by Michel Archambault as for the Michel-Archambault's lake were named in Michel's memory. These installations were used to raise a population of trouts.

Archambeau Creek

Archambeau Creek is a small stream located at only 13.2 miles from Manistique, in the Delta County, near Cooks, Michigan. Fishermen can find a large variety of fishes, including the largemouth bass, the smallmouth bass and the bluegill.

The Shambo Island in the St. Lawrence River



The Shambo Island is located in the St. Lawrence of the St. Lawrence County in the State of New York. The majestic river is more than 700 miles and is the largest west-east river in North America.

This powerful flow offers first-rate angling for muskies, walleyes, northern pike, smallmouth bass, yellow perch, bullhead and carp along its entire length. It also has crappies, pumpkinseeds, rock bass, catfish, Coho salmon, Chinook salmon, lake trout, brown trout, rainbow trout, eels, suckers, drum, and others. The river has been recognized as one of the great carp fisheries.

The St. Lawrence River is an angler's paradise.

Shambo Pond

Shambo Pond is a small lake located at 32 miles from West Yellowstone, in Beaverhead County, near Lakeview, Montana.

Fishermen can find a large variety of fishes, including the largemouth bass, the bluegill and the rainbow trout. Whenever you go angling, trawling or fly fishing, you have a good chance to catch a lot of fishes. So take your favorite fishing rods and gears and head on for Shambo Pond.


People interested to go fishing at Shambo Pond should consult the guide for the fishing plan of the area.

Club de chasse et pêche de Joliette

(Fishing and Hunting Club in Joliette)

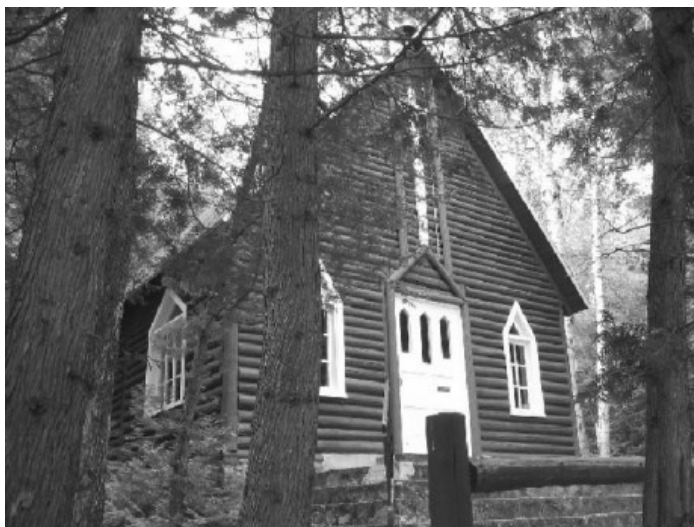
Situated at “Septième Lac”, Chertsey (Lanaudière, Québec)

The Fishing and Hunting Club in Joliette (Lanaudière, Québec) was created on July 3rd, 1893 in the City of Joliette. On this occasion, a group 20 elite persons (such as judges, lawyers, doctors, businessmen...) gathered and attended the signature meeting for the act of the foundation of the Fishing and Hunting Club in Joliette.

The first trouts farms were dated back to 1901-1902-1903. A few years later, in 1907, the Club made a request to introduce a bass farm in Septième Lac; but, this demand was rejected by the Deputy Minister of Navy and Fisheries. At that time people did not far-sighted that, because of this refusal, 100 years later, the lake is still known as a “trouts lake”

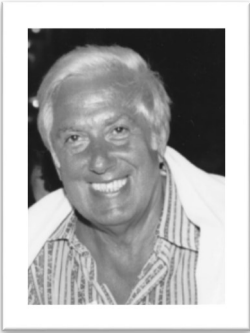
Upon the beginning of the World Wide II, and as for every year, a few members joined the Club. Among them, the future Prime Minister of Québec, Antonio Barette, who was an active member for 10 years; afterwards, he only came back on few occasions to tease trout. Among other well-known figures who were staying at the Club’s accommodations for a more or less long period of time, lets’s mention, Camilien Houde, Mayor of Montréal, who came to trawl, having hired Jos Gagnon as his rower. Later, in the sixties and seventies, residents had noticed, time to time, the presence of Pierre E. Trudeau, Louise Marleau, Diane Dufresne and even members of the Beach Boys group. Also, people of theatre, namely Janine Sutto, who came visiting the Riddez’s family.

In 1949, at Camille Archambault’s instigation, a chapel under the name of *Notre-Dame-du-Rosaire* was built to fulfill church services and to meet Club members’ needs. The chapel was nicknamed Camille’s chapel.



The 1954-55 winter happened to be disastrous for the lake and for the Club's members, despite the residents' endeavors. In July 30th, 1955, the Chairman, Camille Archambault made this announcement:

"...I have the difficult task to tell the assembly that all trees of suitable size for the sawmills and located at a distance of 200 feet around the crown owned forest had been cut down last winter by unauthorized persons."



Obviously, all these actions carried out, will request, besides work and money, a lot of time to intervene with various authorities at all Government levels. To do so, Camille Archambault made appropriate arrangements to comply with this particular kind of lobbying. Each year, the Club was sending baskets of \$10 bottles of champagne to Antonio Barrette (Deputy of Joliette and future Prime Minister), to Maurice Tellier (Deputy of Montcalm) and to Edmond Pouliot (Lands Services for the Ministry of Lands and Forests).

Camille Archambault, founder of the "*Association des Archambault*", was acting Secretary of the Fishing Club of Joliette from 1949 to 1955 and Chairman from 1955 to 1958.

Les Trois-Lacs

At the frontiers of *Cantons-de-l'Est* and *Centre-du-Québec*, Joseph Aimé Archambault, a veterinary surgeon, born on November 26th, 1888 in Saint-Joseph-d'Ély, Valcourt region, son of Christophe and Célaire Perrier, lover of nature and outdoor activities, decided to buy a wooded land where stands three ponds abundant in fishes. Small camps were built; every year, these camps were rented to Americans. After Joseph Aimé's death, his son Paul, also a veterinary, took over.

Le club de pêche et de chasse Michelin

The *club de pêche et de chasse Michelin* (The Michelin's Fishing and Hunting Club) is a former private club situated North of Saint-Michel-des-Saints, (Lanaudière, Québec) at the limit of Lake Kempt, beyond the Manouane's Reserve. Michel Archambault, Vice-Chairman of the "*Association des Archambault d'Amérique*", son of Édouard and Cécile Gendron is the Club's Chairman since 1988.

One of our members, Jean-Marc Archambault, son of Raoul and Rebella Godin, and Michel's cousin, the actual Vice-Chairman is a great amateur of fishing and hunting. Jean-Marc worked in Sports Department at the "*Omer de Serres*" store in Montréal. At the beginning of the year 1960, he started working as a gunsmith, like his father, Raoul.

A few years later, he decided to own a business in the field of hunting and fishing, thus repairing guns, fishing rods and fishing reels of all brands.

His first store was located at # 941-A, Marie-Anne Street Est, in Montréal, and, a few years later, at # 907 on the same street. His wife, Denise Bonamie, helped him in the store for over 18 years.

Michel's father and Jean Marc's father were firefighters for the City of Montréal.

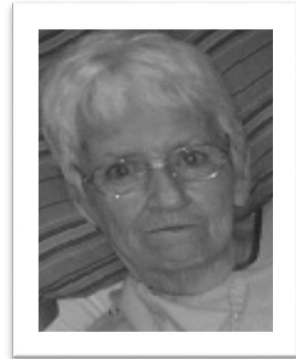


Bill Archambault, Deputy Assistant Regional Director

Bill Archambault began his federal career in 1989 as a fish statistician with the National Marine Fisheries Service in Narragansett R.I. In 1992, he was awarded a Knauss See Grant Fellowship with NOAA's Office of the Chief Scientist in Washington D.C. where he worked on invasive species management and fisheries regulatory actions. He later worked for NOAA's Office of Policy and Strategic Planning in DC, focusing on compliance with the National Environmental Policy (NEPA) and serving as NOAA's liaison to the Council on Environmental Quality (CEQ). In 1999, he joined the Service's Ecological Service Program in the Northeast Region serving as the environmental coordinator for the region and then moved on to the fisheries program in 2002.

With Fisheries, Bill has served as program supervisor for the southern and northern field and currently serves as Deputy Assistant regional Director for the fisheries program. In this position, Bill Archambault oversees the day to day operations for the regions fisheries program which includes 27 national fish hatcheries, fisheries management offices and the Northeast science center.

Bill has a bachelor's degree in animal science from Delaware Valley College and a Masters in Marine Affairs from the University of Rhode Island focused on fisheries.

William (Bill) born in Providence, R.I. on June 6, 1963 is the brother of Senator Stephen R. Archambault of Rhode Island.

Philippe Archambault oceanographer



Philippe Archambault son of Maurice and Suzanne Faucher is a professor at *Institut des sciences de la mer, Université du Québec* at Rimouski, (Bas-Saint-Laurent, Québec). His current general research focuses on the influence of anthropogenic and natural disturbances on the benthic biodiversity functions and the spatial modeling of the benthic biodiversity. Among the disturbances studied are the hypoxia phenomena, the influence of mobile fishing gear and aquaculture-environment interactions.

Philippe has been co-leading (ArcticNet, CHONe, CAISNII, LICO, Canadian-Census of Marine Life, Moorea) or participating in many major International and Canadian research programs (CASES, CFL, HYPOXIA, Aquamen, BECCS, Fisheries, etc). He is also on the Arctic expert panel in the working group Conservation of Arctic Flora and Fauna of the Arctic Council. He is on the Academic Editorial board of the OpenAccess journal PlosOne an Editor for Aquaculture-Environment Interactions and a Review Editor for the journal Marine Ecology Progress Series. He is also invited as external reviewer by the European Commission, to evaluate the scientific research programs developed in Europe

Presently, he is searching funding to build an expedition in the Arctic to study the coastal *biodiversity before the climate change as more ship are crossing the North West passage* and modify completely the Canadian Arctic.

Tom Archambault

A Maine native, Tom Archambault has been involved in the marine science and commercial fishing businesses for over 25 years. He graduated from Bates College in 1969 with a degree in Biology and attended graduate school in marine biology at the University of Miami.

Until 1975 he worked on both pre- (with Central Maine Power) and post- (with the University of Maine) operational environmental studies for the Maine Yankee Atomic Power Plant. For 11 years he was a principal in Maritec, a corporation that provided marine science services and was a leader in Maine's infant aquaculture industry. He spent several years as the manager of the Pemaquid Fisherman's Co-op, the oldest fisheries co-op in the U.S. He is currently sales manager for FISH EXPO in Seattle, the world's largest commercial fishing trade show.

For 10 years, Tom and his wife Linda operated the Mermaid Clambake Company providing lobster bakes in New England and New York.

The Clarence Archambo Family of Black Lake, Michigan

Clarence Gilbert Archambo II, son of Clarence Gilbert and Gladys Kent was born in Toledo, Lucas County, Ohio, April 15, 1925. On April 8, 1947, in Cheboygan he married Ruby Mae Manning.

Clarence lived next to the Black Lake Hotel, built by the Archambo family in the 1920's.

He retired from the Detroit Tap and Tool Company after 30 plus years of services. He served in the U.S. Army Air Corp., later at the U.S. Air Force, during World War II.

Clarence Archambo, built, owned and operated the Black Lake Grocery Store and Resort for many years. In a career shift, he sold real estate for several real estate brokers. He was active in public services, serving as the Grant Township Supervisor and Tax Assessor for nearly 30 years.

He love the outdoors, enjoying hunting, fishing and took great pride in spearing a 155 pound sturgeon, the largest in the state on Mullett Lake in 1993.

Clarence Gilbert II, died on June 6, 2010 in Black Lake, Presque Isle County, Michigan.

One of his son Clarence Gilbert (Gill) Archambault III is director of: Sturgeon For Tomorrow and is wife Brenda is the president.

The Black Lake, Michigan Chapter of *Sturgeon For Tomorrow*, is a non-profit organization dedicated to the future of lake sturgeon. The purposes of Sturgeon For Tomorrow, Inc (SFT) are to assist fisheries managers in the rehabilitation of Lake Sturgeon, to advance education, to further other charitable, educational and scientific objectives, to engage in and facilitate scientific research furtherance of such purposes, and SFT shall be empowered to engage in such other and further means necessary and proper to accomplish the foregoing objects and purposes.



Brenda Archambo founder of the Black Lake Chapter of SFT is also executive director of the Indian River Chamber of Commerce, but her friends call her the *Sturgeon General*.

The group was not made of adults only as often the case, but twenty youngsters join the fun.

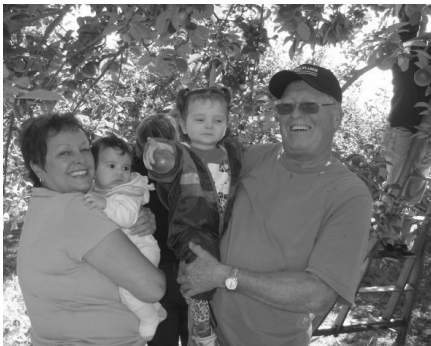

In addition, the film was selected by the Canadian Committee to represent Canada at the Oscars in the category of Best Foreign Language Film.

The film stars are Gabrielle Marion Rivard, herself suffering from the William syndrome, Alexandre Landry, Melissa Desormeaux-Poulin (The film *Incendies*) and Benoît Gouin.

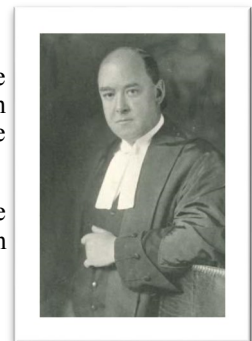

Did you know that...

A variety of serious incidents in the prisons in the 1930s, lead to the formation of a Royal Commission Inquiry lead by Judge Joseph Archambault (1879-1964). The report submitted in 1938 by Judge Archambault prepared the way for the history of correctional services in Québec.

It is why the penitentiary at Sainte-Anne-des-Plaines, in Québec, bears the name of Judge Archambault, son of Gaspard and of Marie-Louise Papin. Joseph Archambault was born and died in Montréal.





For Bass lovers : the *Anthias noeli*.

This new breed of Sea Bass (*Anthias noeli*), discovered at a depth of 351 m (1151 ft) of the coast of Darwin Island in the Galapagos, was given the name in memory of Noël Archambault. He was the son of Richard, Vancouver architect and ex-member of our association and of Patricia Elizabeth Whan. This Sea Bass with brilliant colors is a closer relative to the Atlantic Bass than the Pacific one.

Noël Archambault, cameraman, was killed on June 26th 1998 when the plane he was travelling on crashed on the slopes of a volcano. He was working on the shooting of *Galapagos Rediscovered*, an IMAX 3D movie. His father Richard died on November 23rd 2010 in Vancouver.
